Delegate Richard Anderson hosts Future Delegate Program for students in the 51st House District

During the 2014 legislative session, Delegate Richard L. Anderson has been hosting the second year of his Future Delegate Program, an opportunity for students from the 51st House District to shadow Anderson for a day in the General Assembly. "The students simply immerse themselves in my calendar and my daily schedule," Anderson said. "Whenever possible, I introduce students and families to House leaders, to include the Speaker, Majority Leader, and other senior delegates and senators."

Anderson also said that he provides students with opportunities to interface with Democratic members of the House, in order to encourage the non-partisan nature of the program. "The schedule for each Future Delegate varies just as my daily schedule varies," Anderson said. "But in general, each student is able to attend my subcommittee and committee meetings, as well as the daily floor session of the House of Delegates."

Two-dozen students in grades seven through 12 have already participated in the program during the 2014 session. Anderson said that on most days he and his staff sponsor a single student, but some days they host two students to best fit the families' schedules. "We have an obligation to cultivate the interest of next-generation leaders in the public life of our Commonwealth," Anderson said. "By mentoring young people who are interested in legislative and public policy matters, we will ensure that Virginia's proud tradition continues unabated."

At the conclusion of the 2014 legislative session, Anderson said that he and his wife would host a social gathering of this year's Future Delegate Program students in their home so that the students can meet one another and share their experiences. "I also use the time to discuss the lessons they learned while spending the day at the Capitol and to solicit their suggestions on how we can make the program better in 2015," Anderson said.

Addressing the Need: Bluefield College's Proposed New Dental School

It's the middle of the night. Your head is pounding. You notice in the mirror that your face is beginning to swell. That pesky tooth that you have been meaning to get checked has given you one heck of a wakeup call. Now to find a dentist.... For most of us reading this article that is probably not an issue. But what if you live in a rural part of Virginia? What if you live in Central Appalachia? What if you have a limited income? All of a sudden, your options are severely limited.

This problem of finding a dentist is what many people in Virginia, in certain urban areas but particularly in Southwest and Southside Virginia, face on a daily basis. Availability of affordable dental care, not just to extract that pesky tooth, but to have comprehensive dental treatment at more affordable fees is not easy in a region where the dentist to population ratio is half the national average and over half the dentists in the region are 55 years of age or older. This problem is illustrated by the fact that the region has among the worst oral health statistics in the nation. That is where Bluefield College's proposed School of Dental Medicine enters the picture.

A joint public-private partnership between Bluefield College and Tazewell County, the proposed School of Dental Medicine is poised to provide care at more affordable levels, train the next generation of dentists for Central Appalachia, and help to improve the oral health of rural Virginians, and as a result their general health as well. In addition, the school will provide an engine for economic growth with new jobs in the school, construction of the school and new residential facilities for the students faculty, and staff, the training of 260 students when fully operational with money to spend locally, and improvements in appearance so that people will be more competitive when applying for new jobs. One study has the annual impact at \$13 million to the local economy.

Starting a new dental school anywhere, but particularly in Southwest Virginia, is a daunting challenge. Dental education is the most expensive program in higher education. The reasons for this are that a dental school is not just classrooms and labs, but actually a "dental hospital" with much of the infrastructure that drives up the cost of these facilities. Unlike medical students, dental students provide all of the care for their patients under the direct and close supervision of faculty. The early parts of this clinical training during the students' second and third years will occur at the proposed \$40 million dental school building to be located at Tazewell County's

Bluestone Business and Technology Center on Route US 460. This state-of-the-art facility will have the latest in dental technology for a comprehensive clinical training program with 65 students in each class. During the fourth year, students will spend a majority of their time providing care at a network of community clinics in Southwest and Southside Virginia and beyond. These senior students will return to The Bluestone to gain clinical experiences not available at the network of community clinics, as well.

Some people may ask, "Why do we need another dental school when we already have the Virginia Commonwealth University School of Dentistry in Richmond?" Certainly, VCU is an outstanding school that serves its mission well. Think of the Bluefield College School of Dental Medicine as an additional resource complimentary to VCU. Bluefield can focus more on the 41 counties that make up the Virginia Tobacco Indemnification and Community Revitalization Commission (Tobacco Commission) footprint, many of which have been designated as dental health professions shortage areas by the U.S. Health Resources and Services Administration. The School of Dental Medicine can focus on identifying young people in the region who are both interested in dentistry and want to remain in the region once they graduate. The School of Dental Medicine can also work with local organizations and foundations to develop financial incentives through loan repayment, practice start-up support, or other mechanisms to keep young dentists in the region.

So, what does the Bluefield College School of Dental Medicine need to become a reality by August, 2016? The school needs statewide support from community leaders, political leaders, financial leaders from both the public and private sectors, including the Tobacco Commission and local foundations, as well as from the public health leaders who are all too aware of the oral health problems that many in the region face on a daily basis. The School has garnered substantial support from the Virginia Coalfield Economic Development Authority (VCEDA), The Hugh I. Shott, Jr. Foundation, and the Tazewell County Board of Supervisors totaling over \$18 million, and three national dental companies whose contributions alone total more than \$2 million, and other support from foundations and individuals who believe passionately in this cause. The Tobacco Commission made an initial \$150,000 award to spur initial planning for the School of Dental Medicine, and its members and staff have been kept apprised of the School's progress during the 2014 legislative session. Bluefield College and Tazewell County will seek further substantial support from the Commission later this year. Much more is needed if the oral health of Virginians and the economic outlook for Southwest and Southside Virginia will have a healthy prognosis and those midnight toothaches have a place to go for relief.
